BACKGROUND

From the summer of 2021, until late 2022, members of Teesside Archaeological Society undertook a survey of 'above ground archaeology' – surviving grave monuments – in the churchyard of St Mary the Virgin, Norton: its full name being THE COLLEGIATE AND PARISH CHURCH OF ST MARY THE VIRGIN, OUR LADY OF THE ASSUMPTION.

In total, we recorded a total of 142 'historic' monuments, and the results are summarised below.

Some of those whose names are recorded were born in the 1600s; others died in the 1900s.

In each case, the earliest date of death recorded is over 100 years old (1922) although in some cases, later dates on these same monuments extend into later dates in the 20th century.

<p><i>This monument has fallen down and is currently lying face up on the ground.</i></p> <p>John Waller c.1836- 1902 born c.1836 in Middleton (in Stranton), West Hartlepool: parents believed to be agricultural labourer Henry Waller (born outside County Durham) and his wife Elizabeth (born c.1807 in Hart, Durham) (<i>census data</i>). By the 1851 census, John’s mother Elizabeth is a 44-year-old widow and laundress, living in Stranton with three children aged 7 to 16 years; and 15-year-old John Waller is an ‘engine man’, lodging in Newcastle upon Tyne. Elizabeth seems to have struggled financially for most of the rest of her life: in subsequent censuses she is ‘laundress’ and (in 1881, aged 76) as ‘charwoman’. She also seems to have been cared for mostly by her daughter Elizabeth (John’s sister), as Elizabeth lives with her in 1861, and in the 1881 census her grandchildren (surname Wilson, children of daughter Elizabeth) are listed with her (<i>census data</i>).</p> <p>Jane Elizabeth Waller nee Bennison/Benison, c.1841- 1913, his wife. Born to tailor Henry Bennison/Benison and his wife Mary Lazenby, both born in Middleton Tyas, [North] Yorkshire (<i>census data</i>). Henry and Mary married in Middleton Tyas on 12 Dec 1833 (<i>England Select Marriages, 1538-1973: Ancestry website</i>). In the 1841 census they were resident in Sunderland where Jane Elizabeth was born; by 1851 had moved back to Middleton Tyas (<i>census data</i>); and by 1861 had moved yet again, to Stranton, West Hartlepool (<i>census data</i>).</p> <p>Occupation: For most of his working life, John Waller is an iron shipwright, or plater, in a shipyard: a skilled occupation, laying plates of steel to form a ship’s hull.</p> <p>1860: John Waller and Jane Elizabeth Bennison/Benison married in Hartlepool registration district in 1860 (<i>FreeBMD</i>).</p> <p>Family: Jane’s 1911 census entry states they had 4 children in total, of whom only 2 were still living. However, only three children appear on the censuses: daughter Mary A (1861-before 1871), son Henry Waller born 1866, and daughter Emily Jane Waller born 1874 (commemorated here). Henry and Emily Jane were born in Stockton; and Henry is believed to have remained single.</p> <p>1861 census: they are living in Stranton, West Hartlepool with their 3-month-old daughter, Mary A (who died before the following census); Jane’s parents and older sister Rachel (dressmaker) are living in the same building (<i>census data</i>). Jane’s father died aged 57yrs in 1870, in Stockton registration area (<i>FreeBMD</i>). By 1871, John and his family had moved permanently to Stockton. Subsequently, Jane’s mother Mary is either living close by (1881) or living/staying in their home (1871, 1891) (<i>census data</i>).</p> <p>Emily Jane Spence nee Waller, 1874- 1961, his daughter: birthplace Stockton, county Durham (<i>FreeBMD, census data</i>).</p> <p>Robert Hy Spence 1872- 1948, husband of Emily Jane Waller: birthplace Norton, county Durham (<i>census data</i>). Parents: William Spence (a ‘slotter’ in marine works: born in Yarm) and his wife Elizabeth (born in Ayton/ Kildale) (<i>census data; FreeBMD</i>).</p> <p>Occupation: Robert Spence worked as ‘loom moulder’ in an iron foundry (<i>census data</i>).</p> <p>1898: Emily Jane Waller and Robert Spence married (<i>FreeBMD: Emily’s forename transcribed as ‘Emley’</i>). They shared their home with Emily’s parents (now retired) and brother Henry (also a shipyard plater): living in 1901 in West Hartlepool, and by 1911 in Norton. Their 1911 census entry states they had had 2 children, both of whom had died (<i>census data</i>). They later had at least one more child, son Robert Norman Spence born 23 April 1912 (later, a grocery manager: <i>1939 England and Wales register</i>), who married in 1940 and died childless in 2000 in old age.</p>												<p>Date inferred from first mentioned individual.</p> <p>Inscription:</p> <p style="text-align: center;">IN LOVING MEMORY ... <p>George Clark 1802- 1870: birthplace Whitby, (north) Yorkshire (<i>census data</i>)</p> <p>Mary Clark nee Dobson, 1804- 1858, his wife: from Lyth (Lythe) north Yorkshire (<i>Census data</i>). Probably daughter of Robert and Rachel Dobson (<i>below</i>)</p> <p>Hannah Clark c.1836- 1847, his daughter: birthplace Bishopwearmouth, Sunderland (<i>census data</i>). <i>St Mary's burial record:</i> buried, aged 11 years (of Norton) on 7 Nov 1847 (<i>St Mary's burial records transcribed by Cleveland Family History Society</i>)</p> <p>Occupation of George Clark: Master Mariner (Merchant Navy) and shipowner: From 1850, examination-based Certificates of Competency were required for new (Merchant Seamen) Mates and Masters. 'Grandfather' exceptions were allowed for those who served as Mates and Masters pre-1851: these were granted Certificates of Service. George's Certificate of Service, number 36,561 (issued London 3 Jan 1852) states he was born at Whitby, County of York 13 Feb 1802, and had been employed as Seaman, Mate and Master for 28 years in the British Merchant Service in the Coastling and Foreign trade. (<i>UK and Ireland Masters and Mates Certificates 1850-1927: Ancestry website</i>). In the 1861 census, widower George (shipowner and Master) is listed at the Stranton, West Hartlepool, home of his married daughter Sarah (Sharp): Sarah's husband is also a Master Mariner. In 1869 (now shipowner, late Master Mariner, of Scarborough Street, West Hartlepool) he was appointed a Nautical Assessor for the County Court of Durham (at Stockton and Middlesbrough) (<i>London Gazette, 23 March 1869, p.1881: Google search</i>). Nautical Assessors were 'experienced shipmasters, or those with special knowledge of navigation or nautical affairs, called to give assistance of a Court of Admiralty in difficult cases involving questions of negligence, who sit with the Judge during the argument and advise on questions of seamanship or the weight of testimony' (<i>Black's Law Dictionary, in Academic dictionaries and encyclopedias, online</i>). His address on death (1870) is Norton (<i>burial records transcribed by Cleveland Family History Society</i>), although this may be the home of his son George (below).</p> <p>1 Sept 1823: George and Mary married in Lyth [Lythe], Yorkshire. Mary was 'of this parish [Lyth]'; George, bachelor of 'Whitby parish' (<i>Yorkshire, England, Church of England parish records: parish of Lyth (transcripts) 1838-1873, in Ancestry website</i>). Family: Their four youngest children were born in Bishopwearmouth, Sunderland, between 1827- 1839: George b.1827; Sarah (later SHARP) b.1832; Hannah b.1836; Robert born c.1839. There is also an earlier 15 April 1825 christening record in London for Mary Clark (daughter of George Clark and Mary Dobson; maternal grandparents Robert Dobson and Rachel) (<i>census data: England births and christenings 1538- 1975, in Family Search website</i>). Mary and their children are listed in Bishopwearmouth, Sunderland, without George, on the 1841 and 1851 censuses (presumably he is at sea) (CLARKE on 1851 census). Probably, they travelled at times with George: there is a christening record (above) for a (possible) daughter Mary in London in 1825.</p> <p>In 1858: Mary dies in London. Her burial record states she was buried 20 Jan 1858 in the City of London and Tower Hamlets Cemetery [also known as Bow Cemetery]; her address is given as Wapping Wall; age 54yrs (<i>London, England, City of London and Tower Hamlets Cemetery Registers, 1841-1966: in Ancestry website</i>). Wapping Wall was in Stepney, London, and close to the river.</p> <p>George left a Will (probate 1871) Probate documentation: '<i>The Will of George Clark late of Norton in the County of Durham shipowner and master mariner who died 26 December 1870 at Norton was proved at DURHAM by George Clark of Norton Master Mariner the son the sole executor</i>' (<i>Find a Will, GOV.UK</i>). <p>Elizabeth Gaskill, c.1854 – 1861; Robert Gaskill c.1856- 1861; Joshua Gaskill c.1859- 1861: 2nd, 3rd and 4th children of Jonathan and Frances Gaskill: died within days of each other.</p> <p>John Gaskill, eldest child of their parents (b.18 April 1852, christened 6 June 1852, died 21 July 1852. Born and died in Elland before the family moved to Norton (<i>West Yorkshire, Church of England births and baptisms, 1813- 1910, in Ancestry website</i>)</p> <p>Jonathan Marley (1) Gaskill, 1867-1868, their brother (same parents)</p> <p>Mary Elizabeth Manning nee Gaskill, c.1874- 1894., their sister (same parents). Married 1893 to Edward Thorrald Manning, of North Ormesby, North Yorkshire, in Stockton (brother of Thomas Garibaldi Manning, husband of her sister Isabella Margaret). They moved to Mexico, where she died the following year.</p> <p>Jonathan Gaskill c.1819- 1905, their father: birthplace Bowes, Yorkshire (<i>census data</i>). Occupation: Jonathan was a joiner all his working life (<i>census data</i>).</p> <p>Frances Gaskill nee Marley, c.1818- 1907, their mother: birthplace Fishburn, Durham (<i>census data</i>). On 21 July 1851: Jonathan Gaskill aged 22 years, and Frances Marley aged 23 years, married in Parish of Halifax, Yorkshire; both then living in Elland, Yorkshire. Jonathan's father was John Gaskill, cordwainer; Frances' father, Robert Marley, blacksmith (<i>West Yorkshire, Church of England marriages and banns, 1813-1935, in Ancestry website</i>). Family: 10 children, 8 commemorated here. Their first was born and died in Elland, Yorkshire; the next three died in Norton in 1861. At this time, Frances was pregnant with her 5th child, daughter Frances Ann, b. 19 July 1861, christened 4 Aug 1861 in St Mary's, Norton (<i>record transcribed by Cleveland Family History Society</i>). Their remaining children were born between then and 1874. 1905 Jonathan died and left a will: probate documentation reads: <i>Gaskill, Jonathan, of Norton, county Durham, died 15 June 1905. Probate 10 August to William Henry Gaskill [son] commercial clerk, and Jonathan Marley Gaskill [son] grocer (Find a Will, GOV.UK)</i></p> <p>Jonathan Marley (2) Gaskill, 1869 – 1942, their brother (same parents). Namesake for a previously deceased sibling; unmarried, lived all his life in Norton. Occupation: grocer (<i>census data; 1939 Register; father's Will above</i>)</p> <p>William Henry Gaskill, 1865- 1945, their brother Unmarried, lived in Norton with brother Jonathan Marley Gaskill. Occupation: commercial clerk (<i>census data; 1939 Register; father's Will above</i>)</p> <p>Their other children: Frances Ann married 1884 in Stockton to Thomas Robson (<i>FreeBMD</i>), had a family, and remained in Norton: on the 1939 Register, she is a widow living a few doors away from her brothers. Isabella Margaret married in 1888 in Stockton (<i>FreeBMD</i>): her first 2 children were born in Norton; her 3rd in Mexico in 1893; and two younger children (b. 1900, 1904) in Johannesburg, Transvaal, South Africa.. BASE: Decorative lines on all sides (forward slash)</p> <p>Miriam Seymour 1846- 1865: birthplace Stockton on Tees, county Durham (<i>census data</i>).</p> <p>Born 1846 (<i>FreeBMD</i>); christened 6 June 1847, St Thomas' Stockton (<i>England births and christenings 1538- 1975, in Family Search website</i>)</p> <p>Burial record: Miriam Seymour, 18 years (of Norton), buried 3 May 1865 (<i>transcribed by Cleveland Family History Society</i>).</p> <p>Newspaper death notice: At Norton, 29th ult [April 1865], Miriam, daughter Mr William Seymour, aged 18 (<i>Durham County Advertiser, 5 May 1865, p.8, col 6, in British Newspaper Archives</i>)</p> <p>Family:</p> <p>William Seymour (her father) c.1817- 1897: birthplace Bridport, Dorset. On christening record 19 Feb 1817 in Bridport, parents' names given as Richard Seymour and Miriam (<i>England births and christenings 1538- 1975, in Family Search</i>). His father Richard was a twine merchant (<i>census data</i>). Catherine Atkinson Seymour nee Frankish (her mother) c.1818- 1902: birthplace Barrow-on-Humber or nearby Barton-on-Humber, North Lincolnshire (<i>census data</i>). <i>Christened</i> 11 Sep 1818, Barrow-on-Humber, Lincolnshire: parents Thomas Frankish and Catherine (<i>England births and christenings 1528- 1975 Family Search website</i>). 12 Jan 1839: her parents married in Kingston-Upon-Hull. The newspaper notice reads: <i>On Saturday last, at the Holy Trinity church, Mr. William Sevmour, mate of the brig Isabella, of Newcastle, to Miss Catherine Atkinson Frankish, barmaid of the Crown-and-Anchor, Humber-Street, Hull (Northern Star and Leeds General Advertiser, 19 Jan 1839, p.5, col.6, in British Newspaper Archives)</i>.</p> <p>Her father William Seymour was a Master Mariner (Merchant Navy), and sometime harbour master. His official Merchant Navy Certificate of Service was issued (when these became mandatory) in Chester on 17 Jan 1851: it states he was born in Bridport, Dorset, on 11 Feb 1817, and on the date of issue of the certificate (1851) he had been employed as Seaman, Mate, and Master in the British Merchant Navy service for 19 years in the Coastling and Foreign Trade (<i>UK and Ireland Masters and Mates Certificates 1850-1927: Ancestry website</i>). In the 1851 census (in Cheshire), William SEYMORE is described as 'harbour master'. On subsequent censuses, William is successively as Ship Captain, Master Mariner, and Retired Master Mariner.</p> <p>Miriam was one of four siblings: Richard Seymour, 1st son, christened 20 Dec 1843, St Thomas' Stockton: buried weeks later, on 6 Feb 1844 in Stockton; Miriam Seymour, born 1846, christened 6 June 1847, St Thomas' Stockton; William Thomas Seymour, 2nd son, born 1849, christened 21 Nov 1849, St Thomas' Stockton; Richard George Frederick Seymour, born 1851, christened September 1851 (exact date not recorded), in St Mary's on the Hill, Chester, Cheshire [he was born in Saltney, a cross-border town partly in Cheshire, partly in Wales; and was born in the Wales part: <i>census data</i>): Apart from a time in Cheshire around 1851, the family settled permanently in and around Stockton on Tees, Durham. In the 1851 Census, (name spelt SEYMORE) the family are visitors in the home of one Thomas Price in Chester: the youngest sibling Richard's birthplace was near here later in 1851. In the 1861 census, they are back in the northeast, now resident in Norton, Durham (where Miriam dies in 1865). From the 1871 census onward, they are in Stockton (<i>FreeBMD; England births and christenings 1538- 1975 in Family Search website; census data</i>)</p> <p>Miriam's father William died 1897 in Sedgfield, and her mother Catherine died in 1902 in Stockton (<i>FreeBMD</i>). Her brothers both married and had families and continued to live in the northeast: William in Stockton, Richard in Darlington (<i>census data</i>).</p>													<p>Date inferred from date of those commemorated, not relevant to monument date (<i>Newspaper death notice, burial record</i>)</p> <p>Inscription:</p> <p>SACRED TO ...HE MEMORY ... <p>The first two names commemorated here are:</p> <p>Thomas Simpson, c.1757- 1823: burial record: Simpson, Thomas; 66 yrs (of Norton), buried 3 Nov 1823 (<i>transcription: Cleveland Family History Society</i>)</p> <p>Isabella Simpson nee Robinson, his wife c.1776- 1841: burial record: Simpson, Isabella; 75 yrs (of Norton), buried 26 Mar 1841 (<i>transcription: Cleveland Family History Society</i>)</p> <p>Place/s of origin: In the surviving christening records of their children, Thomas Simpson was a labourer from Hilton [Hylton], Sunderland; and his wife was Isabella Robinson, from Tanfield, Yorkshire (<i>Family Search website; St Mary's christening records transcribed by Cleveland Family History Society</i>).</p> <p>23 March 1791: Thomas Simpson and Isabella Robinson married in Billingham, Norton (<i>England, select marriages, 1538- 1973, in Ancestry website</i>). At least one of their children was christened here in 1793. By 1796, the family had moved to Norton, where three of their children were christened.</p> <p>Occupation: labourer. This information is also included on the 1811 burial record of his 16-year-old son Thomas, who was buried as 'son of Thomas Simpson labourer' (<i>Bishops transcripts, Durham, Norton, St Mary the Virgin, in Family Search catalog</i>).</p> <p>Children: the available surviving christening records refer to a third daughter (Dorothy) and a second son (Joseph), suggesting they had at least 5 children. So far, records have been found for only four of their children.</p> <p><i>It is likely that the semi-legible name inscribed below that of Thomas and Isabella is that of one of their children (possibly Thomas or Dorothy, who are both buried in this churchyard).</i></p> <p><i>Their four known children are:</i></p> <p>1793- 1867: Ann Simpson, christened in Billingham 26 Dec 1793 (<i>Family Search website</i>). <p>George Cummings 1842- 1913: birthplace Stockton on Tees (<i>census data</i>)</p> <p>In 1848, his 36-year-old mother Mary Ann Cummings (maiden name unknown) married 45-year-old widower (with children) William Taylorson: a highway, and later agricultural, labourer (<i>FreeBMD, census data</i>). 1851 Census, the family are living in Norton: his mother's birthplace is given as St Mary's, London; and his step-father William Taylorson's as Neasham, Durham. No children of this marriage appear on this or on subsequent censuses (<i>Census data</i>).</p> <p>Occupation: In adulthood George Cummings worked as a railway platelayer, and also as general labourer (<i>Census data</i>).</p> <p>Jane Cummings 1844- 1903, formerly Catterson, nee Walt, his wife: Born in Kildale, Yorkshire (1881 and later censuses) or in Fishburn, Durham (1871 census, although Fishburn may have been the birthplace of her maternal half-sister (described as 'servant') listed with the family).</p> <p>She married twice:</p> <p>1869: married in Stockton Registration District to her first husband, Bishopton (Durham)-born Thomas Catterson (c.1841-1889) a railway platelayer (<i>FreeBMD; Census data</i>). At the time of her first husband's death in 1889, she had two known children: John George Catterson, born either 16 March 1871 (1939 Register) or around 1876 (<i>census data</i>) (the 1876 date is more likely correct, as he was aged 20 years and 9 months on joining the Army in 1897; and the census data consistently suggests a birth date of c.1876); and Dorothy Hannah Catterson, born 18 August 1878 (<i>census data; 1939 England and Wales Register</i>). Jane and Thomas settled in Norton Junction where Thomas worked as a railway platelayer and labourer (1871, 1881 censuses): in the 1871 census, her younger maternal half-sister (described as 'servant') is living with them. Jane's son John Catterson became a professional soldier (at age 20 years and 9 months) in the Royal Artillery in 1897, spending 14 years of his military career in India (<i>UK British Army World War I pension records, in Ancestry website</i>). He is not currently known to have married. In 1939, he and his sister Dorothy Catterson (also believed single) are both retired and living together in High Street, Norton [Stockton] (1939 England and Wales Register).</p> <p>1891: the now-widowed Jane, mother of two children, is working as a charwoman, and now living in Wilkinson's Yard, Norton (1891 census).</p> <p>1893: Jane Catterson nee Walt remarried to bachelor George Cummings married (<i>FreeBMD</i>). There are no biological children of George and Jane on subsequent censuses.</p> <p>*Note: both of Jane's husbands (George Cummings and Thomas Catterson) are buried in this churchyard; and Jane is commemorated with each, on each memorial. <p>Mary Bell, formerly ‘Toulson alias Tate’ c.1830-1887: first wife of Thomas Bell c.1832-1917: birthplace Little Maltby, Yorkshire (<i>census data</i>).</p> <p>Thomas Bell c.1832- 1917: birthplace given on Censuses as, variously, Croft, Hurworth, and Middleton, in County Yorkshire/ Durham: all near Darlington (<i>census data</i>). As his father was then a railway engineer in the locality, it is likely Thomas was born somewhere between these locations. By 1841, the family are settled in Norton Junction, where Thomas grew up (<i>census data</i>). His parents and several siblings are interred close by in this churchyard.</p> <p>2 July 1855: Mary and Thomas married in St Mary the Virgin church, Norton. Thomas is ‘of Ormesby, officer of customs; father, Thomas, engineer’; and Mary is ‘Mary Toulson (alias Tate); father, John, farmer’. The witnesses were John Toulson and Elizabeth Toulson. (<i>Transcription: Cleveland Family History Society n/d</i>). It is not known whether Mary was previously unmarried, or if she was a widow, at the time of this marriage.</p> <p>Occupation: Unlike most of his family, Thomas did not pursue a career in the Railway industry. He was briefly an apprentice (black)smith; and later (permanently) a Customs (Preventive) Officer based at Cargo Fleet/ North Ormesby, Middlesbrough, living with his family in housing (Customs Cottages) provided at Cargo Fleet, where their six known children were born (<i>census data</i>). The family are listed here in the 1861, 1871 and 1881 Censuses, along with other Customs Officers and their families. Between the 1881 and 1891 Censuses, this housing ceased to be provided for Customs Officers, and in the 1891 census Thomas (now widowed) is living in Thornaby, north Yorkshire (<i>census data</i>).</p> <p>1887: Mary died and is interred here. The decorative motifs on her monument include three Yorkshire Roses.</p> <p>1890: Thomas remarried in Middlesbrough Registration District to 40-year-old Jane Story (born c.1850, Brompton, near Northallerton): no known children of this marriage (<i>FreeBMD, census data</i>).</p> <p>1891 census: Thomas is listed in Thornaby with his second wife, Jane; and some of his children and a grandson. At this stage, Thomas is still working as a Customs Officer. In the 1901 census, Thomas and Jane are living in Middleton One Row (Middleton St George), Durham.</p> <p>1904: Thomas’ second wife Jane nee Story died aged 54 years in 1904, in Stockton Registration District (<i>FreeBMD</i>), burial place unknown.</p> <p>1911 Census: Thomas has returned to Norton, where some of his children by his first marriage now live (<i>Census data</i>). He died in 1917: probate documentation gives his address as Grange Road, Norton, county Durham, died aged 85 years. <p>Young Bell 1839- 1871: birthplace Norton, county Durham (census data). Son of civil engineer (and railway superintendent) Thomas Bell 1801-1875 and his wife Barbara Story 1808- 1870. The first of his parents' children to have been born in Norton, and the family subsequently remained in Norton Junction (<i>census data</i>). His parents and several siblings are interred nearby in this churchyard. Occupation: engine fitter (<i>census data</i>). In May 1862, he married Elizabeth Sandick (born c.1841, Egglescliffe: <i>census data</i>) in St Thomas' Church, Stockton-on-Tees (<i>English Marriages 1538- 1975, in Family Search website</i>): they settled in Stockton-on-Tees. <p>Samuel Shields c.1796- 1850 Burial record St Mary's: Shields, Samuel, 66 yrs. (of Norton) buried 9 Aug 1850 (<i>transcribed by Cleveland Family History Society</i>)</p> <p>Margaret Shields nee Bell c.1793- 1864, his wife Burial record St Mary's: Shields, Margaret, 77 yrs. (of Norton) buried 25 May 1864 (<i>transcribed by Cleveland Family History Society</i>)</p> <p>Samuel and Margaret were parents of at least seven children christened in Norton in the early 1800s: existing christening records for their children (some of which contain the maiden surname of their mother Margaret) range from 1808 – 1826 (<i>Family Search website</i>). Nothing is known about Samuel Shields.</p> <p>His widow Margaret died suddenly in her sleep on the 22nd/23rd May 1864, and was found dead in bed the next morning by her 6-year-old unnamed granddaughter. An inquest on her death was reported in local newspapers: verdict – natural causes. <p>Robert Thorman c.1814- 1854: birthplace Gosforth, Northumberland (<i>census data</i>). He was the second son of Newcastle-upon-Tyne iron agent, Joseph Thorman and his first wife Elizabeth (nee Thomson). On 23 January 1814, he was christened in Gosforth, Northumberland (<i>Family Search website</i>). <i>His inscribed date of death incorrect:</i> his newspaper death notice gives his date of death as 5 June 1854; and the burial records give his burial date as 7 June 1854 (<i>Newcastle Courant, 16 June 1854, p.8, col.4, in British Newspaper Archives; and St Mary the Virgin burial records 1813-1900, transcription Cleveland Family History Society</i>)</p> <p>Eleanor Thorman nee Cuthbertson c.1809- 1871, his wife: birthplace Bishopwearmouth Sunderland (<i>census data</i>). Her family were living in Gateshead by the time of her marriage.</p> <p>30 August 1835: Robert Thorman and Eleanor Cuthbertson married in Heworth, Co Durham. The newspaper marriage notice reads: <i>Married – at Heworth, on Sunday last, Mr Robert Thorman, engineer, to Eleanor, eldest daughter of Mr John Cuthbertson, joiner and cabinet-maker, all of Gateshead (Durham County Advertiser, 4 Sept 1835, p.3. col.3, in British Newspaper Archives).</i> Family: five children (two born in Bavaria).</p> <p>Occupation of Robert Thorman: engineer and engine builder. He spent some years in Bavaria, where his second and third children were born (<i>census data</i>). In 1847 he obtained an appointment as Chief Engineer to the Ottoman government (<i>Durham Chronicle, 15 Oct 1847, p.4, col.5</i>). This would have been a well-paid post, but it is uncertain how long he stayed abroad, as his next two children were born in England in 1848 and 1850 (<i>census data, FreeBMD</i>). In 1848 he became a member of the Institution of Mechanical Engineers, in the second year of this body's existence (<i>UK Mechanical Engineer records 1847-1938, in Ancestry website</i>). In the 1851 Census: Thomas and Eleanor are listed with their family in Newcastle-upon-Tyne. Thomas' occupation: Steam engine builder and millwright. By 1852: There may have been financial difficulties leading to him accepting later paid employment: he is listed among potential bankrupts in January 1852 (<i>The Atlas, 3 January 1852, p.14, col.2, in British Newspaper Archives</i>).</p> <p>His later work included marine engines for ships built at Stockton on Tees, for the firm of Fossick and Hackworth:</p> <p>'Fossick and Hackworth of Stockton-on-Tees:</p> <p>1853 [Fossick and Hackworth] supplied the first pair of marine engines for the first two ships built at Stockton. Eleanor died in 1871 (before the Census) in Stockton Registration District (<i>census data</i>). <p>Edith Atkinson c.1882- 1902: birthplace Norton, Durham (<i>census data</i>)</p> <p>One of a large family, all born in Norton, to William Atkinson (labourer, later driller in the iron industry, born c.1851 in Tow Law, Durham) and his wife Elizabeth Hall (laundress, born c.1852 in Norton, Durham), who had married in Stockton Registration District in 1875 (<i>FreeBMD; census data</i>). 1891 Census: The Atkinson family are living in High Street Norton, the household consisting of (father) William, born c.1851 in Tow Law, Co Durham, labourer; (mother) Elizabeth, born c.1852, Norton, Co Durham, laundress; seven children, all born in Norton (including Edith, William and Elizabeth, named on this monument); and two boarders both surnamed Hall (possibly relations of Elizabeth). 1901 Census: The household (High St, Norton) now consists of a total of 14 people: the two parents, ten children (all born in Norton), and the same two boarders. (Father:) William is now a 'driller, iron'; there is no paid occupation given for (mother) Elizabeth; and all but one of the children aged 14 years and over have paid employment. Possibly the absence of a paid occupation for the mother could indicate that the family's financial status had improved. 1911 Census: The household (Pine Street, Norton) now consists of the two parents (father William employed at Tees Bridge Iron Works), four children including Edith, one grandchild, and one of the earlier boarders. The 1911 census states that the parents (William and Elizabeth Atkinson) had been married 38 years and had had 10 children, two of whom had died. One of these children who had died was Edith, who died aged 20yrs; at the time of writing, it is unknown which of their other children had died (or when, other than between the 1901 and 1911 censuses).</p> <p>Occupation of Edith Atkinson c.1882- 1902: 'dressmaker' (<i>1901 census</i>). Believed unmarried.</p> <p>William HALL (Atkinson) 1869- 1954 her brother: birthplace Norton, Durham. His stated age on Censuses suggests a birthdate of c.1871, before his parents' marriage. He appears consistently in the earlier censuses (including 1911) as William Atkinson (son of William Atkinson senior). However, in the 1939 Register, there is an unmarried William Hall (b.12 Oct 1869) (his mother's maiden surname) living with his unmarried sister Elizabeth (also commemorated here) in Norton. The FreeBMD death index does not (currently) contain a William Atkinson (d.1954) with details corresponding to the monumental inscription. Unmarried. Born 11 June 1875 (<i>England and Wales 1939 Register</i>).</p> <p>Occupation: assistant laundress in her parents' home; later (1911) a live-in domestic servant in The Manor, Norton (<i>census data</i>).</p> <p>1939: living in the family home, 1 Pine St Norton, with unmarried William Hall (b. 12 Oct 1869), a 69-year-old age pensioner approximately the same age as suggested by the earlier censuses for her brother William Atkinson. Possibly this is the same person as her brother William Atkinson: if so, he is now known under his mother's maiden name (<i>England and Wales 1939 Register</i>)</p> <p>1961: probate documentation: Elizabeth Ann Atkinson of 1 Pine Street Norton Stockton-on-Tees spinster died 4 March 1961 at the General Hospital Sedgfield county Durham. Exact birthdate unknown: her varying ages as stated on Censuses suggest a birthdate anywhere between 1817-1896 (<i>census data</i>). Parents: Wiliam Robinson and his wife Sarah (<i>census data</i>). In the 1851 Census, her father William, shoemaker, is living with now-married Mary Ann and her husband Joseph Wanless at Blakiston Hall (a market garden business).</p> <p>19 March 1839: Mary Ann Robinson married Joseph Wanless in St Thomas' church, Stockton on Tees (<i>England Select Marriages, 1538-1973, Ancestry website</i>). Both were single on marriage. Christened in Colchester 28 July 1799 (<i>England, Essex parish registers 1538-1997, in Family Search website</i>). Son (and first child) of the second marriage of Joseph Wanless c.1747- 1847 (to Margaret Brotton c.1768- 1852). All known siblings born in county Durham. Both parents are interred in this churchyard, although there does not seem to be a surviving monument to them.</p> <p>History: from the 1300s to early 1600s, Blakiston Hall and estate (north of Norton) was the home of the Blakiston family, one of whose extended family members (John Blakiston of Sedgfield c.1603-1649) was among those signing the death warrant for King Charles I. Parents: Robert Ingledew c.1770- 1846 and his first wife, Mary Stonehouse c.1770-1818 (his father is commemorated on the adjacent monument). Occupation: iron founder and nail maker, initially in partnership with his father Robert in business premises in Silver Street and the Quayside (both, Stockton on Tees). By 1833, his father's business was re-named from 'Robert Ingledew' to 'Robert Ingledew and son' (<i>Trade directories 1822-23 & 1833-4 South Durham (part), surnames I-L</i>). A 1904 account of a new memorial window in St James' church, Stockton on Tees, erected by his widow to the memory of their son William Paley Ingledew, states that William Paley Ingledew [and, hence, his mother Ann nee Paley] is a collateral descendant of Archbishop Paley (<i>Stockton Herald, South Durham and Cleveland Advertiser, 19 March 1904, p 8, col 2, in British Newspaper Archives</i>). William Paley 1743-1805 was Archbishop of Carlisle; and prolific author of (at times, controversial) theological and philosophical works (<i>Dictionary of National Biography, Vol 15: Paley, pp.101-107, in Ancestry website</i>)</p> <p>27 Dec 1834: Edward Ingledew (of Stockton) and Ann Paley (of Norton parish) married in St Mary the Virgin. The marriage took place with parental consent: the reason for this is unknown as both parties appear of full age (<i>St Mary the Virgin marriage records, transcribed by Cleveland Family Society, n/d</i>). Family: four known children (all commemorated in this complex of memorials; only one survived to adulthood), no grandchildren. No children of this marriage. Ellen (Helen on 1851 census) was born in Northallerton (<i>census data</i>) and buried (age 86 years, of Norton) in this churchyard, although not commemorated on this monument. Her newspaper death notice: 'At Norton ... 30th ult [<i>Jan 1863</i>], aged 86, Ellen, relict of Mr Robert Ingledew' (<i>Durham Chronicle, 6 Feb 1863, p.8, col.6, in British Newspaper Archives</i>).</p> <p>Occupation: wealthy iron-founder, nail maker. The 20 Feb 1798 christening record of his first son Robert describes him as 'nail maker'. By 1822 he had a successful business as iron founder/ironmonger/nail maker/anchor smith, with business premises in Silver Street and in Quayside, Stockton on Tees; by 1833, the business was re-named 'Robert Ingledew and son' (<i>Trade directories 1822-23 & 1833-4 South Durham (part), surnames I-L</i>). On the 1841 Census, he is retired, living 'on independent means', with the business now taken over by his son Edward who lives next door to him in Maratime [sic] Street, Stockton (<i>1841 Census</i>). 1845-1846: Unfortunately, son Edward died in 1845, aged 40yrs; and Robert died the next year, 1846, aged 76yrs. William was christened in St Thomas, Stockton on Tees on 24 April 1837 (<i>England, select births and christenings 1538-1975: Ancestry website</i>). His grandfather and father, Robert (d.1846) and Edward Ingledew (d.1845) (both commemorated in these linked graves) had had a successful iron foundry (also iron monger/ nail maker/ anchor and chain smith) business in Stockton on Tees, with business premises in Silver Street and Quayside, Stockton (<i>Trade directories 1822-23 & 1833-4 South Durham (part), surnames I-L; transcribed by Cleveland Family History Society</i>). However, there is no corresponding christening record for Elizabeth Wilkinson for 1815.</p> <p>John Wilkinson 1811- (1885 or 1886), their son: birthplace Scorton (north) Yorkshire (<i>census data</i>): unmarried. Christening record: born 14 March 1811, christened 15 March 1811, in the parish of Bolton-on-Swale (<i>England select births and baptisms 1538- 1975, Ancestry website</i>).</p> <p>Occupation: draper; co-head of a successful drapery business in Stockton-on-Tees (corner of High St and Finkle Street) (<i>census data: 1851, 1861</i>). Following John’s retirement and their mother’s death, John and Elizabeth set up home together. John is now described as ‘retired draper’, and also has income from several houses (<i>1871 Census</i>). In the 1881 Census, after the death of sister Elizabeth, he has a live-in widowed housekeeper (<i>1881 Census</i>).</p> <p>The date of John’s death was not visible when the inscription was transcribed in 1991/1992 (<i>by Cleveland Family History Society</i>). There are St Mary’s burial records for two John Wilkinson’s: (1) 68 years (of Norton) buried 3 June 1885 and (2) 74 years (of Norton) buried 18 Jan 1886 (<i>transcribed by Cleveland Family History Society</i>). His estimated birth date from his age on the monument (c.1803) differs from that suggested by census data (c.1809).</p> <p>John Lax married twice: John's first wife is identified as Mary Shephard on the 1867 Scottish death certificate of daughter Mary Ann Wren nee Lax (<i>Scotlands People website</i>). Two known children of this marriage. John Lax remarried to Jane sometime between the 1851 and 1861 censuses: in the 1851 census, John is a widower with a son John; in the 1861 census he has a wife, Jane. No known children of this second marriage.</p> <p>Occupation of John Lax c.1803- 1899: mill-owner: owner of Mount Pleasant (wind-)mill and farm at Mount Pleasant, Norton Road, Norton: both taken over in his old age by his son (also John). In 1898 a newspaper reporter was given a tour of the mill, then owned by John Lax (junior) c.1803-1899. The detailed report describes this as the only windmill still active in Norton (another windmill, Norton Mill, now having 'been standing for some three years or so'). Mount Pleasant windmill had been built in 1825; and had been working pretty regularly ever since. In 1845, the owner's father [John Lax senior c.1803-1889) bought the mill for c.£400 from the then proprietor, Mr Corner. In 1847, a seven-horsepower steam engine was introduced into the mill <i>'but this is little used, indeed this class of mill is falling into disuse rapidly throughout the land, improved modern machinery and the still more potent factor of foreign competition having ... made it better to buy flour than to mill it. The Mount Pleasant mill finally stopped operations in c.1920: an early 1900s photograph of it is on the <i>Stockton Picture Archives website (Stockton Borough Council)</i>.</p> <p>Family: Known children of John Lax d.1889 and his first wife, Mary Shephard:</p> <p>Mary Ann Lax c.1830- 1867, married on 16 Aug 1849 to George Wren (a member of a locally prominent family) in St Mary the Virgin, Norton. Marriage notice: 'At Norton, on the 16th inst., [Aug], Mr George Wren, of Stockton, to Mary, eldest daughter of Mr Lax, miller, near Norton' (<i>Darlington and Stockton Times, Ripon and Richmond Chronicle, 25 Aug 1849, p 2, col 2, in British Newspaper Archives</i>). Both were stated as of 'full age' (<i>church marriage records transcribed by Cleveland Family History Society</i>), although census data and her death certificate suggest a younger age (born c.1830). Her husband George Wren was a son of another local mill-owner who owned nearby Norton Mill (and other mills, including one in the area later called Wrensfield, off Bishopton Road in Stockton): his father Thomas Wren and a brother, John Hansell Wren, later became Mayors of Stockton. By the 1851 census, George and Mary Ann had settled permanently in Leith, in Scotland, where George was a Corn-factor. She died in childbirth 1867, giving birth to her 13th child, a stillborn baby (<i>census data; Scotlands People website</i>).</p> <p>John Lax junior c.1836- 1914 never married. He lived with father John and stepmother Jane until their deaths (<i>census data</i>), taking over the family mill on his father's retirement.: he died a wealthy man on 19 Dec 1914. The christening records of some of his children state Thomas Jones (c.1740-1810) is from Oxford (<i>St Mary the Virgin christening records, transcribed by Cleveland Family History Society, n/d</i>). Birthdate uncertain – on his monument, he died in 1810 aged 74yrs (suggesting born c.1736); burial records give his age as 70yrs (suggesting born c.1730).</p> <p>Occupation: Shopkeeper (<i>St Mary's 1803 christening record of son Thomas Sherrington Jones</i>). No known children (<i>marriage records transcribed by Cleveland Family History Society</i>).</p> <p>Now-widowed Ann Wilkinson nee Coulthard is listed in Norton in censuses from 1841 until her death in 1863. In each census, she is living alone (no relatives or live-in servants): successively listed as living on independent means (1841), proprietor of houses (1851), and gentleman's widow (1861) (<i>Census data</i>). In her will, her sole executor is her nephew, Timothy Crosby of Norton, gentleman (<i>Find a Will: GOV.UK</i>). He is included in an 1820 list of freeholders in Stockton as owner/occupier of a house in Stockton Ward <i>(UK poll books and electoral registers 1538-1893, Ancestry website)</i>. An 1823 ‘for sale’ notice describes his premises as ‘<i>commodious freehold dwelling house and excellent front shop, most eligibly situated on the east side of the Market Place, opposite the Town House, in the flourishing town of Stockton-on-Tees ... Mr W Bursey, the owner</i>’ (that is, on today’s High Street, Stockton, opposite the Town Hall) <i>(Durham County Advertiser, 4 Oct 1823, p 1, col 2; in British Newspaper Archives)</i>.</p> <p>Family: four known children of William and Ann Bursay, christened in St Thomas’, Stockton <i>(christening and burial records transcribed by Cleveland Family History Society)</i>:</p> <p>Mary Ann BURSAY christened 29 June 1788 (born at Yarm), buried 14 May 1790 in St Thomas’ Stockton</p> <p>Frances BURSEY, christened 1 January 1790. Mary Hall nee Fawcitt c.1793-1871: birthplace Houlisike [HOULSYKE] Yorkshire (*Census data*).

Thomas Hall c.1795-1880, her husband: birthplace Northumberland, Stannington (1851 census) or Saltwick (1861 census) – hence, likely born in Saltwick Farm, Stannington, near Morpeth (*census data*).

6 Jan 1817: Thomas Hall and Mary Fawcitt married in Danby-by-Egton (Danby-with-Castleton) North Yorkshire (*Vital: England marriages 1538- 1973, in Family Search website*). **Family:** Seven known children. Their oldest child, Andrew, was christened in Glaisdale, Danby, north Yorkshire 15 June 1817 (a few months after his parents' marriage). Their four youngest children were christened in St Mary's, Norton (1825, 1830, 1833, 1838); and two daughters, both full age, were married here (Ann, married Robert Hargrave 1839; Mary, married Thomas Garbutt 1839: *records transcribed by Cleveland Family History Society*).

Occupation of Thomas Hall c.1795- 1880: labourer (1825, 1830) and **farmer** (1833, 1838) on christening records of his children: farmer on census records. He farmed at Island Farm in Bishop Middleham/ Sedgefield (**1841** census); later, (**1851** census) Glebe Farm, c.130acres, situated close to St Mary the Virgin church: Glebe farmhouse is now a listed building (Historic England: 1347779). He continued to farm here until sometime between the **1861 and 1871** censuses, with son John living with him and Mary.

On the 1871 census, now-widowed Thomas is a retired farmer, living with son John and his family in John's home and farm: now Middlefield house and farm (between Stockton and Thorpe Thewles) (*census data*)

Thomas Hall c.1825- 1862, their son: 4th of their known children; christened in St Mary's, Norton 13 March 1825 (*records transcribed by Cleveland Family History Society*). Emigrated to the USA sometime after the 1841 Census (not found on later UK censuses), and died in Boston Mass., USA. His death record states he died on 11 March 1862, aged 38yrs, occupation 'trader', and was married (*Massachusetts US Town and Vital Records 1620-1988; Ancestry website*). There is no information about his wife and any family on this record.

John Hall c.1838- 1899, their son and youngest child: birthplace Norton (census data): christened in St Mary's Norton 25 Feb 1838 (*records transcribed by Cleveland Family History Society*). Later farmed at Middlefield House/Farm until his death (*census data*).

Ann Hall c.1831- 1915, his wife (maiden name unknown): born Dinsdale, Durham (*census data*). Date/place of marriage unknown.

Family: 2 sons born c.1869 and c.1873, both alive on 1911 census. On the 1911 census, Middlefield House/Farm is being farmed by son John Hall, born c.1873, who is living here with his wife, children, and mother Ann. As far as is known, his descendants are still at this farm.

In 1871, she is in Sunderland with her aunt and uncle, Christopher Robson (grocer) and his wife Elizabeth; and in 1881 she (with husband Edward and baby Ada) is visiting her unmarried aunt Mary Gilby in Sunderland. Triangulating these family surnames (Gilby, Barron, Robson) identifies her as the daughter of Thomas Barron and Jane Gilbey (married in Bishopwearmouth, 1854); and another aunt/uncle as Elizabeth nee Gilby and Christopher Robson, who married in 1859 in Sunderland (<i>FreeBMD</i>). Her father Thomas Barron was a shipwright. In the 1861 census he was living with wife Jane and a daughter in Portsea/ Portsmouth, where he was working in the HM dockyard. At this stage Jane was pregnant with Elizabeth: the family moved back to Sunderland before she was born and settled there permanently (<i>census data</i>). 1879: their parents Edward Dowse and Elizabeth Barron married in Sunderland (FreeBMD). Nine children: their older children were born in Stockton on Tees; but from at least 1884 the family had settled permanently in Norton, where their subsequent children were born (<i>census data</i>). Gertrude and Gertie’s parents Edward and Elizabeth, and other family members, are also commemorated in this churchyard. A 1991/1992 transcription reads: <i>In loving memory of Edward Raynell DOWSE d.May 2 1920 aged 66yrs. Also Elizabeth beloved wife of E.R. DOWSE bn Aug 13 1861, d.Oct 2 1949. Also John Norman son of above who d. in France Jul 3 1916 in his 22nd yr. Also Edward Graham eldest son of the above who d.in Johannesburg, S Africa Apr 1 1929 in his 46th yr. Nellie DOWSE dau of the above d.Oct 1937 aged 45yrs. In loving memory of Ann DOWSE bn Apr 1 1831 d. Mar 7 1915. Ethel Annie DOWSE d.27 May 1964. (transcription: Cleveland Family History Society)</i> This unmarried Ann Dowse (1831-1915) appears close to the family. Census records for Ann Dowse, born 1831 (also in Edward’s birthplace Wrangle, Lincs) record her living in Leake Lincs with her siblings (1911, 1901, 1891 censuses), close to where Edward had been a ‘boarder’ in 1851 (<i>census data</i>) – and, earlier, a servant in the household of Natt Wedd, corn merchant (1851). Ann moved north sometime after the 1911 census, dying in Stockton, Durham in 1915 (<i>FreeBMD</i>). Her siblings died not long after: unmarried sister Elizabeth, 1916; and widower brother John 1917, both in Boston, Lincs. She was not a native of Norton and has been identified through her death certificate. The stated ages on her monumental inscription, marriage record, and death certificate, all suggest a birthdate of c.1849- 1850. There are multiple birth records for 'Elizabeth Butler' born around these years (<i>FreeBMD</i>) Birth family: her father is named as Joseph Butler, farmer, on her marriage record (below). but no definitive identifiable census record has currently been found for either Elizabeth or her father Joseph between 1851- 1881 inclusive. 17 Aug 1882: Elizabeth BUTLER married William CONNELL c.1850- 1913 in All Saints (Church of England), North Street, York (Ainsty and City of York), Yorkshire on 17 August 1882. Elizabeth Butler is described as 31years, address Rougier Street [York], occupation not given, estimated birth year 1851, father Joseph Butler, farmer. William Connell is also 31years, also of Rougier Street, occupation butler, father Thomas Connell, carrier (<i>York, Yorkshire church of England marriages 1754-1936, in Ancestry website</i>) This marriage was only five years before her death: there are no known children.</p> <p>1887: The death certificate of Elizabeth Connell states that she died on 24 July 1887, aged 38yrs, of '<i>heart disease, angina pectoris, 3 hours</i>'. It described her as the wife of William Connell, hotel keeper: his address is given as Alexander Hotel, Redcar. It is unusual for a 38-year-old woman to die of what is essentially a heart attack. Burial record: Robert Hardy, 76 years, Darlington, buried 6 December 1870 (<i>transcription, Cleveland Family History Society, n/d</i>)</p> <p>Family: Robert and his first wife, Frances, had one child, daughter Eliza (on census records, Eliza F), born 10 May 1831, christened 15 August 1831 in Richmond (St Mary Magdalene), Surrey. The family's then address was Kew Road, parish of Richmond. Her parents are given as Robert, carpenter, and Frances. (<i>Surrey, England, Church of England baptisms, 1813-1917, image 24 of 168: Ancestry website</i>). Shortly afterwards, the family moved north to Norton, Durham, where Frances died aged 23 years ('of Norton') and was buried in 1833. Sometime between 1833 and 1842, Robert remarried to Hannah and had two further known children. St Mary's burial record: William Brooks, 13 yrs, Stockton, buried 18 Oct 1864 (<i>transcription, Cleveland Family History Society</i>).</p> <p>Elizabeth Brooks nee Wilkinson c.1823- 1888, their mother: birthplace Norton, Durham (<i>census data</i>). Christened 30 March 1823, in St Mary the Virgin (<i>christening records transcribed by Cleveland Family History Society</i>). One of 11 children of William (born in Heighington, Durham) and Mary (nee Mellanby) Wilkinson, who married in Thornaby, (north) Yorkshire, in 1811. Her older siblings were born in Maltby, (north) Yorkshire. Between 1818-1820, the family moved permanently to Norton, Durham, where the younger children including Elizabeth were christened. Her father, a successful joiner/cartwright, is described as 'yeoman' on his 1854 Will, in which all his surviving children incl. Elizabeth receive substantial legacies (<i>Durham wills pre-1858, Family Search</i>). 1888: St Mary's burial record: Elizabeth Brooks, 65 years of Stockton, buried 25 Sept 1888 (<i>transcription: Cleveland Family History Society</i>)</p> <p>In 1847, Elizabeth Wilkinson married John Brooks c.1822- 1870 in Stockton on Tees (<i>FreeBMD</i>). He had been born in Bonsall, Derbyshire; and in the 1841 Census, he and Elizabeth were unmarried servants in Elwick Hall, Durham (<i>census data</i>). They set up home in Elwick, where John is 'house servant' (1851) and later 'butler (1861)' (<i>census data</i>). <p>Mary Corner nee Bayles c.1830- 1857: birthplace c.1830 in Ravensworth, North Yorkshire (<i>census data</i>).</p> <p>Occupation: in the 1851 census she is a 21-year-old unmarried housemaid, employed in the same household as her future husband William Corner (<i>census data</i>).</p> <p>William Corner c.1826- 1897, her husband: birthplace is given variously as Houghton-le-side, Heighington, and Dalton (all Durham): these locations are within a few miles of one another; hence he may have been born in a semi-rural location in their vicinity (census data).</p> <p>Occupation: servant/ coachman, later gardener (<i>census data</i>). In the 1851 census he is a servant/coachman in a private home in Melsonby, Richmondshire, North Yorkshire. The ‘master’ of the house is James Barmby, a clergyman, whose wife is described as ‘Rector’s wife’ (hence, most probably this is a Rectory) (<i>census data</i>)</p> <p>1853: Mary Bayles and William Corner marry in the registration district of Richmond, Yorkshire, in 1853 (<i>FreeBMD website</i>): we have no definite record of any children. St Mary the Virgin burial record: William Foss, 59 years, Stockton, buried 20 Nov 1869 (<i>transcribed: Cleveland Family History Society</i>). Son and brother of the Foss family on adjacent monument. Along with his mother and brother, a beneficiary in the Will (proved 1813) of his yeoman maternal grandfather, Robert Crisp (<i>Durham wills pre-1858, in Family Search</i>): then, they were Robert’s only known descendants. Occupation of William Foss: surgeon and apothecary (General Practitioner). He obtained his L.S.A. (Licentiate of the Society of Apothecaries) in 1827. An 1835 newspaper article reads: ‘ANATOMICAL PRIZE – the prize for the best practical Anatomist, given by Mr Sheriffs, of the Brown Square School, Edinburgh, has this Session been awarded to Mr William Foss, of Stockton-on-Tees, brother to Mr [Robert] Foss, Surgeon, &c., of the same place. There were not less than 30 competitors’ (<i>Durham Chronicle</i>, 1 May 1835, p.3, col.2, in <i>British Newspaper Archives</i>).</p> <p>William Foss practised in Stockton-on-Tees: Medical Directory entries read ‘FOSS, William, 22 High-st, Stockton on Tees – L.S.A. 1827; late Surg. Stockton Disp.’ (<i>UK & Ireland Medical Directories, 1860, 1865; in Ancestry website</i>). There are multiple newspaper reports wherein he gave medical (post-mortem) information on deaths. He was active in local affairs. His obituary (praising his skills and work ethic) states he died at his residence, High St, Stockton, on ‘Tuesday’ [16 Nov 1869], aged 58yrs, of erysipelas; some years previously he had been a member of the Town Council, in 1867 he contested the North-East Ward election, losing by one vote; and was an antiquarian, collecting ancient and rare books (<i>Newcastle Courant</i>, 19 Nov 1869, p.5, col.6, in <i>British Newspaper Archives</i>).</p> <p>Hannah Foss nee Dawson c.1811- 1888, his wife (probably the now-illegible central inscription): born Guisborough, (north) Yorkshire (<i>census data</i>). Occupation: currier and leather cutter, with business premises in High Street, Stockton, Durham from at least 1827-1828 (<i>Trade directories 1822-1834 Northumberland Durham and North Yorkshire by place name</i>). In the early 1830s, he became (temporarily) bankrupt, spending some time in a debtor’s prison. The reports of his discharge from bankruptcy add that he was then ‘of unsound mind’ and had originally been sued ‘with Robert Crisp Foss’ (although there is no record of son Robert Crisp Foss ever having been bankrupt) (<i>British Newspaper Archives: Perry’s Bankrupt Gazette, 9 July 1831, p.3, col.1; and Durham County Advertiser, 1 July 1831, p2. col.1</i>). He died a couple of years later, in 1833, and was buried here, aged 56 years (of Stockton) on 17 Feb 1833: name mis-transliterated as TOSS (<i>St Mary’s burial records transcribed by Cleveland Family History Society</i>)</p> <p>Robert Crisp Foss c.1807-1837, his son: birthplace unknown (possibly Stockton-on-Tees). Presumably named after his maternal grandfather. Occupation: Surgeon and Apothecary (it was usual to obtain these double qualifications); and worked as ‘<i>surgeon and apothecary</i>’ in High Street, Stockton (<i>Trade directories 1822-1834 Northumberland Durham and North Yorkshire by place name: 1833-1834 listing</i>).</p> <p>12 Jan 1837: Robert Crisp Foss married Emma Whitfield c.1808-1884: ‘At Norton, near Stockton, on the 12th inst [January], Mr Robert Foss of Stockton, surgeon, to Emma, daughter of the late Mr Joseph Whitfield, of the latter place, linen manufacturer’ (<i>Durham Chronicle, 20 Jan 1837, p.2, col.6, in British Newspaper Archives</i>). Unfortunately, Robert died four months later. His newspaper death notice reads: ‘DEATHS ... on the 22nd ult [May 1837] ... same day, after a short illness, at Mount Pleasant, Mr Robert Crisp Foss, surgeon, a gentleman distinguished for professional ability, humanity of disposition, and more especially for unwearied attention to the suffering poor. His loss is sincerely deplored by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance’ (<i>Durham Chronicle, 2 June 1837, p.3, col.2, in British Newspaper Archives</i>). His commemoration, in Latin, ‘Dignus Laude, Multi Habilis’ loosely translates as ‘worthy of praise, multi-skilled’. He was buried here on 3 June 1837 (<i>St Mary’s burial records, transcribed by Cleveland Family History Society</i>). The couple had no children; and his widow Emma never remarried. She moved in with her older unmarried sister Elizabeth Whitfield, and with her ran a (boarding) school for girls in, initially, Norton, and later in Bishopton (Durham) (<i>Census data</i>). The sisters died within a couple of years of each other, and are buried together in St Peter’s Churchyard, Bishopton, Durham. The word ‘SORORES’ (sisters) links their inscriptions: ‘Emma, widow of Robert C. Her father Robert Crisp (‘yeoman’ of Norton) left a Will: its provisions indicate he was wealthy. Beneficiaries include his wife (lifetime provision); <i>daughter ‘Jane Foss wife of Christopher Foss of Stockton aforesaid, Currier and Leather Cutter’</i> – her inheritance ‘to and for her own use and benefit during her life and not to be subject to the debts control or engagements of her said husband’ (a not uncommon provision, to protect a married woman’s finances); and Jane’s sons, Robert and William Foss (commemorated here and on the adjacent monument), along with ‘any more children’ Jane may yet have. Birthplace: Chelsea, London (<i>census data</i>). His paternal grandfather, John Hogg 1800- 1869 of Norton (great-grandson of the above John Jefferson c.1694- 1753) died 1869. His children – including son John Ewer Jefferson Hogg 1860- 1914 (Richard's father) – were taken to the south of England, to be cared for by their mother's relations: they and their descendants did not return to reside permanently in Norton (<i>Hartlepool Northern Daily Mail, 15 July 1887, p 2, col 6, in British Newspaper Archives</i>).
